### **\*FAIR RULES \***

1. The public is invited to exhibit. All exhibits may be entered on Thursday evening from 5 to 7 pm and Friday morning from 9 to 11 am. All exhibits must be in place by 11:30 am on Friday. Exhibit hall will be closed to the public while the exhibits are being judged.
2. No exhibit may be removed before 5:00 pm on Saturday.
3. Entry blanks must accompany all entries and can be found at the center page of this premium list.
4. All entries must be made, grown, selected and arranged by the exhibitor since the last fair. All entries must be entered by an individual, not a family or farm name.
5. An exhibitor may make only one entry in a given category.
6. New classes may be created at the discretion of the fair management, provided there are three or more exhibitors.
7. Youth exhibits are for children under the age of 18 as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year. Age must be included on the entry form for all youth exhibits.
8. The committee reserves the right to reject any and/or all those exhibits that are not listed in the premium list and also those of undesirable quality.
9. Items containing cannabis or related substances cannot be exhibited.
10. Poisonous and endangered species of plants cannot be exhibited.
11. Prizes will be awarded only to quality exhibits and the decision of the judges will be final.
12. All perishable products not picked up by 6pm on Saturday will be sold at auction with the proceeds given to help defray the expenses of the fair.
13. The fair will take due care of all entries but is not responsible for their loss or damage.
14. Prize ribbons will be awarded to all winners in addition to the cash premiums offered in this list.

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## **WHAT THE JUDGES LOOK FOR**

### **Vegetables & Fruits**

1. Exact number of specimens as called for in the premium list and prepared as specified in the premium list
2. Uniformity – each specimen like each other in size, shape and color
3. Quality – not too large, not too small, fine texture
4. Freedom from blemishes – no cuts, bruises, insect injury or disease
5. Cleanliness – produce washed or wiped as one would prepare for market
6. Carrots, turnips & parsnips – cut tops to ½ inch, leave tap root
7. Onions – cut tops to 1 inch, wipe clean
8. Cabbage & Cauliflower – cut off roots, remove outer leaves
9. Squash & Pumpkins – leave stems on
10. Potatoes – wiped dry, do not wash
11. Tomatoes – Red, stems off; Green, stems on
12. Peppers – all should have the same number of lobes

### **Canned Goods**

1. Products should be of the best quality, uniform in size, and of good color
2. The liquid should be clear, free from sediment and proper amount in the jar
3. The container should be uniform, clean, properly sealed and labeled with a minimum of the date and contents.

### **Baked Food**

1. Foods are to be properly covered using transparent materials and accompanied by recipe
2. Foods should be attractive, have good color, texture and flavor

### **Clothing and Home Furnishings**

1. Condition of article, suitability, construction and workmanship, design, color, originality and ease of care

Flowers must be grown, selected and arranged by the exhibitor.

To be judged for horticultural perfection, should include sufficient stem and foliage when practical. When stems or spikes are specified, each may have multiple flowers or blooms. Endangered species and poisonous plants cannot be used.

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## CLASS 15 – Fun Dog Show

NEW THIS YEAR - The Fun Dog Show is a family-friendly event where any dog is welcome to enter. It is not a professional dog show – our goal is to have fun and show off everyone's adorable dogs! Winning dogs in each category will receive a ribbon and cash prize listed below. Best of show winner will also receive a rosette and cash prize.

### Dog Show Rules

#### Registration and Judging

1. There is no entry fee to participate.
2. All dogs must be registered to participate. Registration forms can be found on p. 21 of this book and will be available at the Fair.
3. Use one registration form per dog. All registration forms must be submitted between 1:30 - 2:15pm on Saturday, August 24.
4. Owners must select which categories each dog will be entered into. Categories are listed on the registration form.
5. Each individual dog must be accompanied by their own handler.
6. Children may enter and show a dog, but they must be accompanied by an adult who is responsible for the dog and child.
7. The decision of the judge will be final.

#### Health and Safety

1. **All dogs must be accompanied by a valid and current vaccination certificate for rabies.**
2. All dogs must be in proper physical condition and free of visual evidence of infectious, contagious or parasitic disease, including kennel cough, distemper, hepatitis, parvo, ringworm and mange.
3. All participants must be in control of their dogs. Dogs must be kept on leash.
4. Dogs must be well-behaved in order to participate – participants whose dogs are exhibiting threatening or aggressive behavior or are otherwise misbehaving may be asked to leave.
5. Fair officials reserve the right to exclude any dog who appears sick or is not well-behaved.
6. Participants must clean up after their dogs.

All products, including jams and jellies must be sealed by processing. Boiling water bath canning for fruits and tomatoes; steam pressure canning for vegetables. Prizes will be awarded based on the quality of product and workmanship as shown by the condition of the exhibit. Should have proper amount of liquid, clear and free of sediment.

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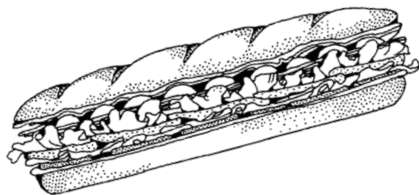
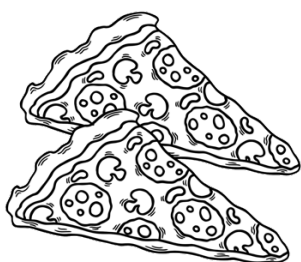
